7 Hebrew For Praise

You Were Planned For God's Pleasure (WORSHIP) Revelation 4:12 "(God) created everything, and it is for (His) pleasure that they exist and were created." The Bible says you were created for God's enjoyment. Just like a parent enjoys watching his/her kids, God enjoys watching you be you- most of the time! He made you to love you, and so you could choose to love Him back. That is your #1 purpose in life. When we love God back that is Worship. Worship is often misunderstood. When we say the word "worship," you may think of prayer. You may think of singing. You may think of ritual or communion or something you do in church. But worship is far more than all those things.

•Worship is MY RESPONSE to God's love. God made the first move; He loved you first. He's waiting to see if you will choose to love Him back.

•Worship is <u>GIVING BACK</u> to God. God gives to us. Whenever you give back or "offer" something to God, that's called worship. #1 thing you can give Him is your love. He's got everything else. But God doesn't have your love unless you choose to give it to Him.

Worship is <u>FOCUSING</u> my <u>ATTENTION</u> on God. We think about hundreds of things every day. So, when *you choose to stop thinking about all the other things* you *could be* thinking about, and *choose instead to think about God*, that is

worship. "God, I'm thinking about You right now. You are important to me." God loves that. That's worship.

Worship is <u>EXPRESSING</u> my <u>AFFECTION</u> to God. For some of you, this is difficult because you grew up in families that weren't very affectionate. Didn't say, "I love you" much. You're going to have to learn how to express affection. <u>Tip</u>: If you're thinking about God, you're already halfway there. You just need to think w/feeling: "God, I'm thinking about You, and I want you to know, I love you. I'm thankful for my relationship with you. Thank you for loving me...caring..."

We're going to help you EXPRESS AFFECTION to God. Every time you see the word "praise" in the Bible, it comes from one of 7 Hebrew root words that describe a particular way to praise the Lord. That *specific way* of praising the Lord got 'lost in translation.' We're going to teach what each of these 7 words *mean*, and then practice what we learn.

Halal (huh-lawl') to shine; to make a show, to boast, to be clamorously foolish, to rave, to celebrate; to express an extreme degree of admiration or approval. To give extravagantly [spend much more than is necessary; excessive; go beyond what is justifiable; unrestrained. Praise that borders on being excessive/foolish. One of the root words for Hallelujah. Makes me think of fans at sporting events who aren't afraid to cheer, lose their inhibitions, celebrate with singing, shouting, and boasting about their teams' performance.

In *Halal* praise, one *ceases to be self-conscious* or *worried about what others think* of our behavior. It is being *totally consumed* by the passion of expressing our love for God. 2 Sam 6: David danced before the Lord "with all his might." Matthew 26, Mark 14, John 12, woman who broke her expensive alabaster jar of perfume (worth more than a year's wages) and poured it on Jesus head and feet, wiping his feet with her hair. Selfless, extravagant, praising God *with everything we have*, holding nothing back.

Deuteronomy 6:5 Love the Lord your God will *all your heart*, and with *all your soul*, and with *all your might*."

"Bless the Lord, O my soul, and *all that is within* me bless His holy Name." Psalm 103:1 *How many times have you done that?*What would that be like?

In context: Psalms 22:22: I will tell my people about You. I will praise (halal) You in the great assembly." "I will praise you in front of people as though You're the only One watching."

T'hillah (te-hil'-la) to sing praises extravagantly; to celebrate with song. Spec: a hymn of praise. The act of praising God highly in the song. Halal is spoken praise; Thillah is singing Halals.

Enter into His gates with thanksgiving and into His courts with praise (Thillah). Psalm 100:4 ("...singing praises unto God with all you've got.")

You are the Holy One; you are enthroned upon the *praises* (thillah) of Israel. Psalm 22:3

Sing joyfully to the Lord, you righteous; it is fitting for the upright to *praise (thillah)* Him. Psalm 33:1

Yadah (ya-dah') The Hebrew word Yadah comes from two root words: Yad which means the open hand, direction; and Ah which references Jehovah. Together they mean Hands to God. To use or hold out the hand; to worship God with extended or lifted hands.

Psalm 67:3 Let the people *praise (Yadah)* thee, O God; let all the people *praise (Yadah)* thee.

Psalm 63:4 I will *praise* you as long as I live, and in your name *I* will lift up my hands.

Psalm 107:15 Oh that men would *praise (yadah)* the Lord for His goodness, and for His wonderful works to the children of men.

Ill: When a child wants attention from a parent they lift their arms so mommy/daddy will pick them up. That analogy can be applied to God.

Another perspective: "One day...I saw myself standing in praise to God with my hands lifted towards heaven, and I saw the glory of God descend between my uplifted arms, much as is described in the Bible when the glory of God's presence came to rest between the wings of the cherubim on the mercy seat in the Tabernacle. It was as if God was saying,

'You are, as a believer, the dwelling place of the Holy Spirit. My blood paid for your sins. I am in you, and I am your mercy seat. Your uplifted arms are your body's counterpart to the outstretched wings of the cherubim. As you praise Me, I will enthrone myself and my glory upon you.'"

Towdah (toe-dah') an extension of the hand. A sacrifice of praise or thanks. The implication is that we are to raise the hands as in a court of law swearing to "Tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth." It's a form of praise where we raise our hands and say/repeat what God says.

"Enter His gates with thanksgiving (Towdah: w/your hand upraised speaking truth) and into His courts with (Tehillah) praise." Psalm 100:4 We enter into God's presence through a gate and the Key to the Gate is Towdah Praise where we come in speaking/confessing the truth about who God is.

Ill: "The Lord is good, and His mercy endures forever, His faithfulness continues through all generations." "Great is the Lord and greatly to be praised." *Towdah* is also thanking God for "things not yet received" as well as things you already have.

Zamar (za-mar') the idea of striking with the fingers. To touch the strings or parts of a musical instrument; to play upon it. To play/sing songs of praise with instruments.

Psalm 92:1-3 It is good to give *praise/Yadah* to the Lord, and to *Zamar* to Your Name, O Most High; To declare Your love in the morning, and Your faithfulness at night, to the music of the tenstringed lyre and the melody of the harp.

Psalm 98:5&6 *Praise/Zamar* the Lord with the harp...and the sound of a psalm; with trumpets and the sound of a horn.

Barak (buh-rock') to kneel down, to bless God as an act of adoration. When we kneel or bow we are expressing our love, submission, and trust in God.

Psalm 95:6 O come let us worship and *bow down*; let us kneel (barak) before the Lord our maker.

1Chronicles 29:20 Then David said to all the assembly, 'Now *bless* (*barak*) the Lord your God.' And all the assembly *blessed* (*barak*) the Lord, the God of their fathers. They *bowed low to the ground* to give honor to the Lord and to the king.

Psalm 34:1 I will *bless (barak)* the Lord at all times; His praise shall continually be in my mouth.

Bowing shows humility, submission, honor, reverence. We cannot live life on our knees. But we can always live in submission/humility towards God.

Shabach (shuh-bach') to address in a loud tone. To shout praises to God triumphantly! Over and over we're told to shout, or praise God loudly.

Psalms 145:4 One generation shall *praise (Shabach)* Your works to another and declare Your mighty acts.

Psalm 5:11 But let all those rejoice who put their trust in You; let them ever *shout for joy...*

Psalm 32:11 Be glad in the Lord and rejoice you righteous; and shout for joy, all you upright in heart."

Psalm 17:1 Clap your hands, all you peoples! Shout unto God with a voice of triumph!

A mighty *shout of victory* is a powerful form of praise. At the Battle of Jericho, on the seventh day, God told Joshua to march around the walls one last time and then to have all the people give a loud shout (and the walls came tumbling down.) With only a 300-man army, Gideon defeated the vast Midianite army, and the battle plan was to break jars, blow trumpets, and shout, "A sword for the Lord and for Gideon!" Shouts of praise to the Lord, makes the devil run!
